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Religion in the UK

Throughout its long history, the UK has been deeply shaped by religion and faith. From Celtic paganism to Catholic and then Protestant Christianity to secularism and the migration of foreign religion, our nation has experienced various belief systems, each of which has impacted the UK in a different way.

Pre-Roman forms of religion in Britain included various forms of ancestor worship and paganism. For example, over two hundred separate Celtic gods have been named and many people believe that in addition to the gods, the Celts were animists, believing that every part of the natural world had a spirit.

Many believe that it was Augustine's famous mission in 597 AD from the Pope in Rome to King Aethelbert of Kent that really set up the future course of Christianity in Britain, creating a strong alliance between Christianity and Kingship. Since then, Christianity has had a firm hold on England and influenced its governance.

Through the early Middle Ages, the Catholic church dominated England however, the Catholic church of the day had little gospel inspiration. Instead, most Christians simply followed a set of actions in the belief that they would grant them passage to heaven. For example, going to church, praying set prayers once a day and giving money to charity. They might have read their bible but with little passion for how it should impact their lives. This was all changed by the reformation, a movement that swept across Europe, carried on the shoulders of the likes of Martin Luther in the 15th century. It found new inspiration in the life of Jesus recorded in the gospels and called for God's word to have a life changing impact upon peoples' lives. It gave a sense of the dynamic, something transforming, something to take hold of your life and turn it inside out.

King Henry VIII established the Church of England on the 3rd of November 1534. The Church grew power and influence as it gained wealth and land. Due to the lack of governmental involvement in the lives of the common people, the Church soon became the main institutional power, and the source of help for most people across the UK.

Throughout the age of the British empire and the years following the World wars, people from across the World sought refuge in the UK. This resulted in a huge increase in diversity and the introduction of new religions such as Islam which is followed by over 6 percent of the population. The Royals

In early 2020, Prince Harry and Meghan Markle announced that they would be formerly stepping back from royal duties and moving to Canada. This shocking decision was the first of its kind and the couple have since come under large amounts of media attention. Then on January 10th 2023, Prince Harry released his much-anticipated autobiography 'Spare'. It fast became the most sold book on the first day of publication, selling 1.4 million copies. In it, Harry revealed many details about his life and childhood living in the royal family.

Details include:

- -He recalls visiting his grandmother on her deathbed.
- -He took a number of drugs to escape from reality.
- -Him and William begged their father not to marry Camila.

The response:

The rest of the royal family have so far paid little attention to the claims made by the Duke of Sussex and have instead chosen to carry on as normal, appearing on several occasions in seemingly good spirits. This has been effective as they have given Harry no platform for further criticism.

Harrys comments on his time in the army were heavily frowned upon, especially by military or ex-military personnel. Retired-commanding officer Colonel Collins condemned the book by calling it a "tragic money-making scam". Another serviceman still serving told the BBC Harry's comments were "very unsoldier-like". A Ministry of Defence spokesperson, when asked about the prince's kill number, said: "We do not comment on operational details for security reasons."

Apple M2

Q&A With Mr Gort (Assistant Headteacher)

What made you go into teaching?

"To be honest, it wasn't my first choice of career. When I left school I originally wanted to be an actor. I then studied History and Politics at university and wasn't sure what I wanted to do with my degree but later on, it just clicked. How can I continue my love of learning and passion for my subject? I needed to become a teacher."

What jobs did you have before you became a teacher?

"When I finished my degree, I got a job at brand new multiplex cinema. I'll never forget that the world premiere of the film 'Batman Forever' was held at our cinema and I met several Hollywood stars and celebrities, including Boy George.
