The Red Kite

Hello, in today's issue we're starting off the new Nature spotlight section.

HISTORY:

The red kite, despite its name, is in fact a bird and not something you'd try to fly on a string. These days this species is quite rare because in the late 1800's the species was heavily hunted and mistakenly shot by game keepers for birds that killed game. By the 1880's the species had been pushed to the brink of extinction, being completely wiped out from England and Scotland with only a few pockets of them remaining in Wales. One hundred (and a bit) years later in the 1990's the species began, slowly to be re-introduced to Great Britain. From Wales they steadily made their way around England and are getting more and more common.

ABOUT:

The red kite now breeds and permanently lives in south England and central Wales. Some red kites are also seen as winter residents around the coasts. This large bird of prey, with a wingspan of 180 – 200 centimeters, has a top flight speed of around 100mph! Their diet consists of mainly voles but also other small rodents and even other birds! That's all for now, I hope by reading this you have found something out about one of Britain's most successful reintroduced wildlife species. 112 OPERATOR

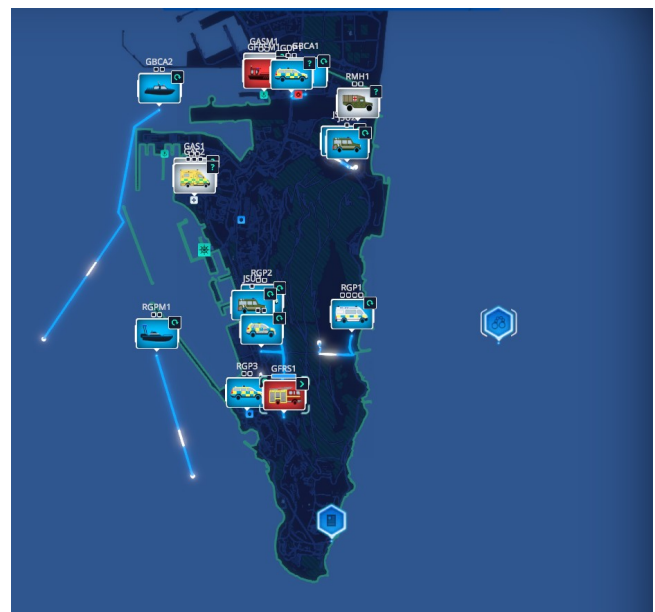
112 Operator is a top down management game where you play as an emergency dispatcher in any city worldwide. The sequel of 911 Operator. It hosts many improvements.
