What's the new reading scheme you've started?



Q&A with Georgia Callagher (Cinderella at Buxton Opera House)

What made you want to do Buxton pantomime?

"I am very grateful to say this is my second time performing in the Pantomime at Buxton Opera House and I hope not the last! I love it here! The company is absolutely amazing, I feel very lucky to be able to work with such experienced creatives. The energy of the company is always so enthusiastic too, and I feel privileged to share the stage with all the incredibly talented performers."

How did you get in to acting?

"I always loved performing from a young age, singing into the mirror at home, wanting to perform little shows in my living room for my parents! So, when I was about 8 I started attending dance and musical theatre classes which is where the interest became a hobby and soon grew into a passion. I studied drama and dance through my secondary school years and took singing lessons after school also. I used to feature in the local pantomimes as a dancer too. Then, when I was 17 i successfully auditioned for some of the top performing arts colleges in the UK and was offered a place at Bird Conservatoire of Professional Dance and Musical Theatre. I trained there for 3 years, achieving a First Class Degree and also managed to get an agent who works to get me auditions."

What were your favourite lessons at secondary school?

Drama and History!

"I adored Drama at school, I found it so fun, my teachers were great, the lessons were so interactive, and I loved creating and devising scenes. I also enjoyed analysing scripts to understand the characters' intentions, motives or emotions. This is a skill I still use today.

History I also loved as I found it so interesting, I enjoyed learning about all these past events that have had such an impact on our lives today without us realising. My dad is very knowledgeable too, so I grew up listening to his historic factual stories and so history at school felt quite the same."

Did you always want to be an actress growing up?

"I think I always knew I wanted to perform in some way for a living, I wasn't sure if that would be singing, acting, dancing or all three but there is nothing else I have ever imagined myself doing."

What other shows/productions have you been to?

"Since graduating 2 years ago I have been the lead in 3 pantomimes, I was Princess Jasmine in 'Aladdin' in Lincoln, Sleeping Beauty last year at the Buxton Opera House and now Cinderella!

Earlier this year I also performed as a D-Day Dollie, singing 1940's classics to residents in care homes around London, merging my love of history and performing.

Whilst training, I performed in a musical called 'Big Fish' where I played 'The Witch'. And I have also performed in multiple pantomimes from ages 14-18 as an ensemble dancer."

Is this your first main/leading role?

"This is my 3rd! Princess Jasmine was my first."

Do you get nervous or excited before performing?

"A bit of both! I get more nervous for auditions but then once on stage, I find so much enjoyment and excitement it overrides my nerves."

Cinderella Comes To The Opera House!



The UK's first vertical rocket launch spaceport has been approved. It was designed by SaxaVort an aerospace engineering company, based in Grantown-on-Spey. They are the first UK based vertical rocket launch. They are, however, not the first UK based rocket company. On January 9th, 2023, a satellite, designed by an Oxfordbased company was launched via a Virgin Orbit Boeing 747 carrying a rocket booster. The spaceport is the first of its kind in the UK. The UK gaining a spaceport is very important for national economics. This is important because the space industry is one of the most economically prosperous fields predicted for the next decade.
