points for the house at the end of the year.


What do you hope the Houses will achieve in the long term?

Q&A With Mrs Warrington (Assistant Head)

What made you go into teaching?

"During my 20s I was working in London and not really enjoying my work. At the same time lots of people were encouraging me to go into teaching, including my mum who used to teach English to overseas students. I applied to university to do my PGCE to see what would happen and was accepted so it all started from there."

What jobs did you have before you became a teacher?

"I had a few small jobs while I was a teenager from waitressing to serving coffee at Costa. Before I became a teacher, I was a runner on the tv show 'This Morning'."

When did you join the staff here?

"I joined in 2004 when I was 24 years old."

What do you enjoy about being a teacher?

"I enjoy working with students and while teenagers get a negative portray in the press, I think that they are actually brilliant. I enjoy the day to day variety and helping students make their next steps in life when they go off to university. I loved being a 6th Form tutor."

Is there anything that you dislike about teaching?

"I dislike the fact that we have had a lot of Education Secretary's and that they keep on changing the priorities and that we need to select some priorities and stick to them. I dislike having to work within a very small budget, I wish schools were given more money."

Are there any movements in school that you are particularly interested in?

"I am particularly interested in enrichment and trips. I love running trips to different countries and have led lots, especially during my time as Head of Geography. We have been to Italy, Iceland and New York. Wider experiences are a vital part of education. I'm really excited about the opening of the Study Zone where the Upper Atrium is. I'm trying to create a lovely space for

learning and for students to use for their own independent study, it's really exciting and I hope the students will love it once it's done."

What were your favourite subjects when you were at school?

"My favourites are English and Geography."

Where did you go to university?

"I went to Leeds University."

What did you do at university?

"I did Geography and Media."

What did you want to be when you were growing up?

"I wanted to be a vet. Everything I did in school and in work experience was working towards that. After a while I realised that I wasn't going to get the grades needed in Science to progress in that career which is a shame. I think now with the support we give students, that would be much more likely."

What are your hobbies/interests?

"I like spending time with friends and family but have very little time for hobbies of my own now between work, my sons love of football and his matches and ponies! I love horses and we have a pony in the family who takes up a lot of time. I had horses myself when I was younger and have now passed that passion on to my daughter."

What is your official role in the Senior Leadership Team?

"My official role is Assistant Headteacher in charge of Progress and Outcomes."

What does that job entail?

"I look carefully at where students are in terms of their learning and how they can make the most progress possible by the time they leave. I look at how we can support, intervene and work with departments to ensure the best provision for students at BCS. I manage a couple of departments and the Directors of Progress in their new roles."

Met Police Corruption

Recently, more than 1,000 Metropolitan Police officers have been suspended or put on restricted duties, the force has said, as it tries to root out rogue officers. The police have started their crackdown because of the recent convictions of two police officers who have been found guilty of serious crimes. The 'eye-watering' figures show that over 450 police officers are being investigated for misconduct and abuse allegations. Some officers believe it's going to take a long time (at least 2-3 years) to get rid of the corruption whereas others in the force believe the Met have uncovered most of it already. One of the main units focused on is the Parliamentary and Diplomatic Protection Command (the same unit Wayne Couzens and David Carrick the police officers mentioned earlier were in). The PaDP is an elite taskforce of officers charged with protecting the House of Parliament and many embassies around London. The Home Office has announced that senior police officers will be given more responsibilities to police the matter further and make sure it doesn't happen again in future.

Trump Arrested

Former United States President Donald Trump has been indicted (sent to court) 4 times now has been charged on 55 separate counts of various crimes. US Lose a Fighter Jet

On Sunday the seventeenth of September a USAF fifthgeneration stealth fighter jet went missing above South Carolina USA, here's what we know:

- At the time of ejection the fighter jet was at 1,000ft. (0.19 miles). The speed is unconfirmed.
- The jet was found 28 hours later on Monday the 18th.
- The fighter jet was put into autopilot mode before ejection.

The F-35B has an 'auto-eject' feature for when a pilot is unconscious or if the plane is critically damaged. Whether this was the case is yet to be confirmed.

The pilot confirmed that there was a malfunction in the jet. To what extent is still unconfirmed but there is a pentagon investigation into the crash. The F35x fighter jet is the most internationally exported modern fighter jet with almost 900 in the world. 30 of which are owned by the UK. The day after the crash there was a total stop for all US air force and US marines' aircraft. Something even more interesting is that the 911 operator that the pilot called from a nearby house seemed totally confused. The pilot had to explain the incident multiple times to the operator. The fighter jet was developed and manufactured by Lockheed Martin inc. Surprisingly they are yet to make an official public statement on the matter. More will be revealed but at the time of publishing this is all that we know...
